October 27 Meeting Minutes

hapter Director Ellary Kahan called the October monthly chapter meeting to order at the Whistle Stop Café at 9:30 am. The meeting was attended by Andy Toth, Bob Manion, David Bierman, Ellary Kahan, Gary Cueno, Gary Wanke, Glenn Hanson, Greg Natenberg, Guy Newell, Jim Thomas, Mark Muhlenfeld, Steve Donato, Tim McGuire, and Tony Valicenti.

Ellary passed around a sign-up sheet for the Holiday Party and said that it will be available at the next meeting for additional signees. He said that John Martens asked him to tell every one of the newest Honda recall to replace an internal bolt in 2018-2021 Gold Wings. David stated that if it fails, the engine will shut down without seizing. No details and schedule have been released by Honda so far. Similarly, Tony said that BRP has announced a potential recall of pre-2019 Can-Am Spyder RTs to replace an internal drive shaft. A few have broken and no details and schedule have been publicized.

Tim discussed October events which included a Brunch Ride to the Busy Bee on October 5 and noted that in EWMA spirit, there were more non-Gold Wings riding than Wings that day. Everyone enjoyed the good food and reasonable prices. Speaking of good food and good friends, Tim said that everybody enjoyed both at the Annual Harms Chili Social on October 19. We enjoyed a flavorful vegan chili by Ellary, Barb's chili con carne, and an all-meat chili by Greg, as well as wonderful appetizers, salads, and desserts. Ed and Barb furnished mulled apple cider and coffee, and all left full and happy.

Although Ellary was not optimistic about November rides, he pointed out that there are always warm days popping up, so our riding season may not be over just yet. November will include a dinner organized by Gary Wanke at the Gale Street Inn in Diamond Lake on November 9, and is expected to be just a dinner, but if the weather is warm, it may be a dinner ride. Stay tuned for updates. The Chapter meeting on November 24 will include our annual planning session for 2025 activities, so think about what you would like to do next year and discuss it at the session. Some suggested a winter ride down South. Andy said that next year's National Veterans Awareness Ride will be dedicated to Larry MacKay.

David reminded us of seasonal safety issues such as riding through leaves which can be slippery when wet, and especially slippery when under foot. He also said that as a light changed to green this morning, even though the intersection appeared to be clear, he pulled out slowly just in case a distracted or impaired driver ignored their red light. He also said that an article in Rider by Quinn Redeker, a motorcycle officer, on slow-speed riding, emphasized the use of your feet on the foot pegs, your knees on the tank, and shifting your body position for counterbalancing instead of relying on your handlebars alone which has made him a more proficient slow-speed rider. David said that 2018 and newer Gold Wings are much better balanced than the older Wings and easier to practice the new techniques. He now has fun practicing these techniques on daily rides to avoid road hazards such as sewer covers, pot holes, etc., and has gained new confidence in slaw speed maneuvers. Mark brought up CPR/First Aid training and certification, and the group felt that we were due. Ellary said that EWMA offers this at a low cost to members. Tony will see if Craig's facility would be available.

Tony reminded people that it is deer rutting season and that many dead deer may be on the roads. The meeting was adjourned around 10:40 am, and Tim led eight of us on a terrific ride to J Lauber's Ice Cream Parlor in East Troy, Wisconsin.

The Good Book Guide

n Tess Gerritesn's **The Mephisto Club**, the Latin word *PECCAVI* is scrawled in blood at the scene of a young woman's brutal murder: "I HAVE SINNED". It's a chilling Christmas greeting for Boston medical examiner Maura Isles and Detective Jane Rizzoli, who swiftly link the victim to controversial celebrity psychiatrist Joyce O'Donnell – Maura's professional nemesis and member of a secret society called "The Mephisto Club."

On tony Beacon Hill, the club's acolytes devote themselves to the analysis of evil: Can it be explained by science? Does it have a physical presence? Do demons walk the earth? Drawing on a wealth of dark historical data and mysterious religious symbology, the Mephisto scholars aim to prove a startling theory: that Satan and his demons actually exist among us.

With the grisly appearance of a corpse on the Mephisto Club's doorstep, it's clear that someone – or something – is indeed prowling the city. The members begin to fear the very subject of their study. Have they inadvertently summoned an evil entity from the darkness?

Delving deep into the most baffling and unusual case of their careers, Maura and Jane embark on a terrifying journey to the very heart of evil – where they encounter a malevolent foe more dangerous than any they have ever faced...one whose work is only just beginning.

Tess Gerritsen's *The Keepsake* is a gripping medical thriller that weaves together elements of forensic science, suspense, and character development.

To Maura and Boston homicide detective Jane Rizzoli, the forensic evidence is unmistakable, its implications terrifying. And when the grisly remains of yet another woman are found in the hidden recesses of the museum, it becomes chillingly clear that a maniac is at large—and is now taunting them.

Archaeologist Josephine Pulcillo's blood runs cold when the killer's cryptic missives are discovered, and her darkest dread becomes real when the carefully preserved corpse of yet a third victim is left in her car like a gruesome offering or perhaps a ghastly promise of what's to come.

The twisted killer's familiarity with post-mortem rituals suggests to Maura and Jane that he may have scientific expertise in common with Josephine. Only Josephine knows that her stalker shares a knowledge even more personally terrifying: details of a dark secret she had thought forever buried.

Now Maura must summon her own dusty knowledge of ancient death traditions to unravel a murderer's twisted endgame. And when Josephine vanishes, Maura and Jane have precious little time to derail the Archaeology Killer before he adds another chilling piece to his monstrous collection.

Gerritsen's writing is taut and engaging, effectively building tension as the plot unfolds. The dual perspectives of Rizzoli and Isles allow for a rich exploration of both the investigative process and the emotional stakes involved. The themes of obsession, the preservation of life, and the ethical dilemmas of medical practices are explored in depth, making the narrative not only thrilling but thought-provoking.

The pacing is brisk, with twists that keep readers guessing. Gerritsen's background in medicine lends authenticity to the forensic details, enhancing the overall realism of the story. Fans of the series will appreciate the character development, as both Rizzoli and Isles face personal challenges alongside the central mystery.
